As in other years the number of people we support continues to grow at a fairly fast pace. While this growth is a positive testimony

to our success, it also continues to present challenges for our limited resources. This has been a significant focus for all of us at Vela during this past year. Our volunteers, board and staff have been working hard adapting and creating new and better ways of supporting people with Microboards and those in receipt of Individualized Funding. This has led to the opportunity for all of us to learn new skills and think about how we can continue to evolve and provide our supports in innovate ways.

We have added some short, educational video clips on our website

and Facebook page. You can read all about our continued Communications work in Maria Glaze's report on behalf of the Communications Committee on page 7.

Our Community Relations Committee helped to educate us on the work that is needed to expand our funding base, as is noted in Kim Houllind's report on page 7.

Kim Thomas, Vela's Office Manager, has stepped into, and definitely stepped up for, new challenges, taking on the role of our Fund Development Officer. We are impressed with her commitment and have already seen some positive results of her efforts. For more details you can check out Kim's report on page 8.

Sherry McDonald, Vela's Treasurer, has once again provided us with some useful graphs demonstrating

where our funding comes from, how we use those dollars and showing just how valuable our dedicated team of volunteers is for Vela. Her report can be found on page 6.

Once again the staff at Vela have worked hard to ensure that the assistance we provide not only meets the needs of those we support, but each of the team continues to expand their own knowledge base to ensure they can provide up to date information and support. We are very fortunate to have such a dedicated staff. You can read their reports starting with Jeanette Holder on page 9.

During this year we have supported the development of over 100 Microboards and assisted 40+ people to create supports with Individualized Funding. We have answered countless calls for information and ideas. Vela's staff provided 25

workshops for over 400 people in 17 communities in B.C.

Vela has also been involved in a number of projects this year. A few new Microboards have been working with two PhD students, both from Australia, that have been researching supports provided through Microboards. This is mutually beneficial. The information that the students collect will better inform us on how we can do our work in more effective ways. I would like to thank those of you that agreed to participate in the research. As well, we thank Ellen Walker and Michelle Browning for the insights their respective PhD research provides for us.

Terry Robertson and I have been involved in qualitative research designed to get a better understanding of how families are responding to Individualized Funding as provided through Community Living British Columbia funding options. This research is also helping to inform our work.

I am also sitting on CLBC's advisory committee for Individualized Funding. This allows us to share information and ideas with others that are committed to ensuring IF remains a viable and positive option for individuals in British Columbia.

As part of Ellen Walker's research, she has graciously invited me and Joanne Nunn (from Western Australia) to co-present an overview of Microboards at the International Association for the Scientific Study of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities conference being held this July 2014 in Vienna.

We are also looking forward to the opportunity of participating in an international conference on Individualized Funding and Self Determination taking place in Vancouver in the fall of 2015. I have

been fortunate to work as a member of the planning committee and will be chairing the International Engagement Group.

All of these opportunities allow us to share our knowledge with others, locally and internationally, as well as learn from those involved similar work. The exchange of ideas and expertise is extremely valuable for our work.

This year Caitlin Goodsell, one of our Facilitators, began a one-year maternity leave. We miss Caitlin but were pleased to welcome Dorothy Hyslop as her replacement. We are also delighted to hire JP Sandoval into a new position as Manager of Communications and Marketing. JP comes to us with a wealth of experience and we are very fortunate to have him on our team.

None of this would have been possible without the guidance and support of our dedicated board of directors. This year we will be saying good-bye to a number of board members, several that have served 4 consecutive 2-year terms, the maximum allowed in our by-laws. We are so grateful to Jeff Moulins and Cathy Lafortune for their many years of work on our board. Kim Houllind is also stepping down this year. She will be greatly missed. Kim has been a positive catalyst for change and growth. We owe her a great deal for bringing fresh ideas and expertise to our organization.

After serving Vela for eight years, in different positions on our board, Evan Thomas will also be stepping down as Vela's President. I would like to thank Evan personally and on everyone's behalf for all he has done to guide our organization to meet the challenges we have faced and to prepare us for a positive and productive future.

All four board members are wished the very best and we will miss you!

I would like to offer my heartfelt thanks to the many volunteers that support our work. We are extremely fortunate to have such a dedicated group of individuals with a high level of skill assisting us with our communications, technical and other professional needs. There are many others that also assist with our office support, allowing our staff to focus on their other responsibilities.

Summary of our Resources and How We Use Them

The feedback we received from last year's Annual Report showed that people appreciated the addition of the three graphs

showing where our funds come from, how we use them and what in-kind supports we receive. As a result we have provided these again this year.

If comparing graphs to last year's, you will see what appears to be a dramatic reduction in funds received from Gaming revenue (2012/13 - 29% this 2013/14 - 13%). This is in response to the shifting of payments from Gaming. A number of years ago our Gaming revenue was moved from Bingo funds to Direct Access, but those funds did not flow at the same time. There was a delay of approximately 9 months. Each year we would borrow against the next year's funds to balance our budget. This year our board of directors decided to correct this by adjusting the budget to meet the actual receipt of the funds. By providing a correction for this year only, we anticipate the contribution for subsequent years will more accurately reflect the funds we receive. I would also like to point out that donations/memberships for 2013 are up 2 1/2 times, which is a significant step in the right direction.

In the second graph you will see that the support to our tenant and condo management has gone down. This reflects the reduced number of tenants. Our direct staff support to those with Microboards and Individualized Funding has gone up from 82.5% to 86%.

And finally, in the third graph, our "In Kind" support estimates have

gone up by approximately \$5,000.00, from \$58,000.00 in 2012/13 to \$63,000.00 in 2013/14. Within that you will see we have relied heavily on our volunteers to assist us with administrative tasks and the development of new information for our website, newsletter, and Facebook page.

This type of graphing is proving useful to show how our demands and needs shift from year to year, and demonstrates the commitment of our organization to continue to strive to provide as much direct assistance to those with Microboards and Individualized Funding as is possible.

However, we have also come to realize that, with the growth in demand for our supports, we must also now look to increasing our ability to generate funds to meet that demand. This has led to a refocusing of some of our staff resources to fund development. We are very pleased with the work being done by Kim Thomas as our Fund Development Officer, and our recently hired Marketing and Communications Director, JP Sandoval. This refocusing is in response to the board's visioning and goals for our future.


I believe this coming year will bring with it many new and positive changes in how we look to diversify our funding supports.

Thank you to our volunteers, board and staff who continue to strive to provide excellent support in a fiscally responsible way.




WHERE OUR MONEY COMES FROM

our growth and future direction. As a result of this, the Community Relations Committee was put on hold pending the release of a plan.


In keeping with this, I am pleased to announce that in early 2014, JP Sandoval was hired as our first Communications and Marketing

Fund Development Officer's Report

When our board of directors decided to create a Fund Development Officer position, I was honoured to be offered the position.

As part of the long term strategic planning for our organization, fund development is a necessary and new approach for us. Many non-profits and charities are faced with a situation similar to ours. It is imperative that we reach out to those facing similar challenges, build relationships, and establish funding streams other than those through government. With these other revenue sources we can become self-sustaining and ensure stability for our organization over the long term.

It has been an exciting and challenging several months in my new position with a steep learning curve and much more to understand; but, I embrace each new challenge and am confident in the direction and process forward.

The first task I undertook was to increase our membership. Our organization supports over 900 families province wide, yet our membership was only at 97 current members. I am very pleased to report that as a result of a new approach to our membership drive, membership not only increased, but the membership and donation dollars received were more than double last year. It is my goal to increase membership this next year and to establish regular donors.

I will continue acquiring skills through webinars, workshops, conferences, reading and networking. I am very excited to be taking a two-day fund development essentials course at BCIT shortly.

This year I thought I would add up my hours by category and see how they actually compare. I was surprised to see my administration hours as high as they are. I expected my general Microboard and Individualized Funding hours to be the highest, as that has been the main area of my work over the last year.

This included:

- > finishing our new brochures (have a look on our website if you have not had a chance to see them – love the photos);
- > continually updating the documents we give to Microboards and IF Agents;
- > researching and creating new material for Microboards and IF Agents (e.g. layoff and termination information);
- > revamping our Microboard & IF Powerpoint presentation;
- > creating Facebook posts;
- > minor changes to our website;
- > uploading documents to our website for Vela Members to access; and
- > attending meetings of the Communications Committee.

I have supported six new Microboards this year (several have received funding) and provided a lot of support to approximately sixteen older Microboards. I rarely receive calls about IF, but have supported 5 new IF Agents in the last two months,

taking over calls in the Lower Mainland while Caitlin is on leave.

Several families told me they were surprised to see me at their Transition Fair in Port Alberni and Victoria. They had heard that CLBC is no longer funding Microboards. I reassured them CLBC continues to support Microboards and all of the families decided to form boards. Two are now funded.

When first developing our website and Facebook page I found the book Social Media for Social Good an excellent resource. I continue to receive their newsletter and decided to take an online course they recommended, Content Strategy for Professionals: Engaging Audiences for Your Organization, through Northwestern University. I was a little nervous, never having taken a course online before, but found it very helpful and I learned a great deal.

Glyn Townson, our much valued technical volunteer, has offered to teach me more about analytics for our website and Facebook page. Are we being effective? Are we providing the information people need? It can be hard to tell by just looking at the

numbers, so I hope Glyn will provide me with insight into what those numbers really mean. I will also create a short questionnaire for our Facilitators to use when meeting with families to get some anecdotal information on what works and does not work on our website. If you have feedback you would like to share with me to improve our website and Facebook posts, please contact me, I would really appreciate your input.


I am looking forward to the coming year and working to provide Microboards and IF Agents with the material they need to do the best job possible.

The Thompson/Okanagan regions and the Lower Mainland continue to remain extremely busy. The past fiscal year

has resulted in positive funding results for a number of adults and children. It should be noted that for the most part, securing funding took a great deal of time particularly in Children's Services.

Unfortunately, several families in Children's Services were in crisis. These families needed intense front end and continued support. I can't state enough that despite ever evolving challenges, they remained the driving force that helped to secure funding for their family member. In Kelowna there appears to be movement from the school district to consider services to kids in their over-age year. This will alleviate the immediate pressure that some families are facing.

There were four presentations that I was a part of this fiscal year:

- Two were in Kelowna for individuals and /or their families.
- One was in Langley with parents and self-advocates attending.
- The fourth presentation was in Vernon for CLBC staff members.

In the Thompson/ Okanagan Regions

Children's Services:

- Ten individuals are in the process of incorporating.
- Four individuals have incorporated.

Adult Services:

- Eleven individuals are in the process of incorporation.
- One individual has incorporated.

Lower Mainland

Children's Services:

- Six individuals are in the process of incorporation.
- Two individuals are incorporated.

Adult Services:

- Eight individuals are in the process of incorporation.
- One individual has incorporated.
- Two individuals are requesting that their funding is moved to IF.

In closing I see growth, especially in the Okanagan. Word of mouth and the examples of many individuals receiving their support via a Microboard or IF has accounted for the continued increase and demand for Vela's support.

I would like to thank CLBC and MCFD for their commitment to individuals and their families.



After a particularly long winter and cold spring everyone is eager to be outside and enjoying buds and blossoms.

It seems to me that as more families become aware of the work that we do, word spreads and the number of calls I get increases exponentially. In this region I have become known as someone who can help families develop the supports they need and it has increased the demand for our services significantly.

The first couple of years I spent a good deal of my time explaining who we are and what we do. Although I still do a lot of that more families are finding me through the "family network" that has been created over the last couple of years. Family to family communication is always the major information network.



There have been a number of difficult situations in this region in the last couple of years. I think we have worked hard on behalf of those families to establish a relationship with CLBC staff in the region that has allowed good outcomes for all of the individuals and families we have supported. CLBC managers continue to change in the region. We are always working towards developing good relationships with them and their staff, so we can support our clients the best way possible.

Linda Perry and I have made some new contacts with the Ministry of Children and Family Development and Rob Rail, the manager of the Navigator Project for Prince George, has called me for my input on their project. I recently invited Fred Ford up from Victoria to speak with families about the expanded role of the Child and Youth Advocates Office, and how they can assist with advocacy for individuals and families.

Microboards continue to be in high demand for families in the region. In this past year we have also had a few families choose Individualized Funding and we are glad to see people understanding their choices and options.

We have been part of some Community Development work in very small villages here in the north and we are excited by the way we have been able to connect families to create new and exciting opportunities for their children.

Spring is always busy as families who have children transitioning out of school focus on "what's next" for their son or daughter. I have had five new calls from families wanting help this week and it is only Wednesday. This makes me suspect this will be another busy year as more and more people become aware of who we are, what we can offer and understand that we are here to help them through the systems and choices they must deal with to create a "good life in welcoming communities" for their sons and daughters.

On the Microboard front, last year was noticeably marked by families seeking assistance for transitioning youth. While this is still the case, this year I have also noticed a large number of individuals and families seeking Microboards who are hoping to access Health funds, either by themselves or in combination with funding from CLBC.

With Individualized funding, I noticed a significant increase in the number of families requesting assistance that had questions concerning the differences between employees versus contractors and with questions around Direct Funded Respite. Trying to figure out whether or not they, as the Agent, are an employer or not and which, if any, deductions need to be made is an issue that many people find confusing.

This year I also had the opportunity to attend three transition fairs as the Vela representative, which gave me the chance to meet and interact with

a large number of new individuals and families. Many people who visited the Vela table had heard about Microboards only in passing, or not at all, and this gave them the chance to ask questions and gather more information in an easy fashion. Many people were also surprised to learn that we offer assistance to those accessing Individualized Funding and were grateful to have another resource to help them work through what is often a very overwhelming process.

Glyn Townson, as Jeanette has noted in her report, continues to be our 'go to' guy when it comes to technology. Glyn


